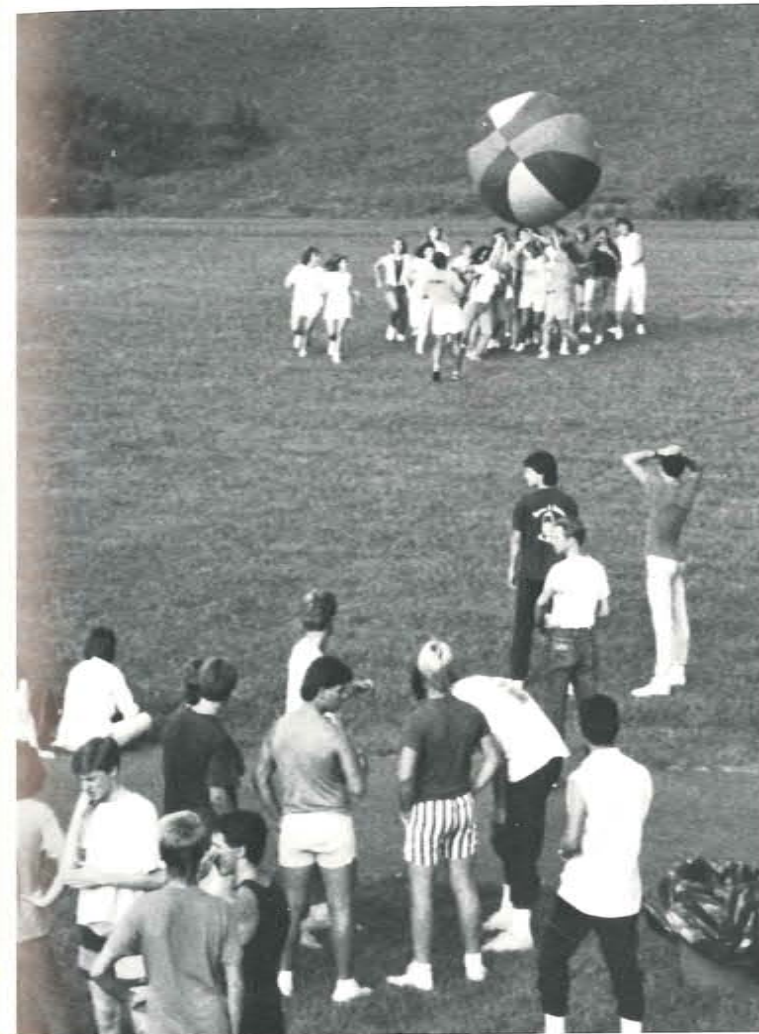

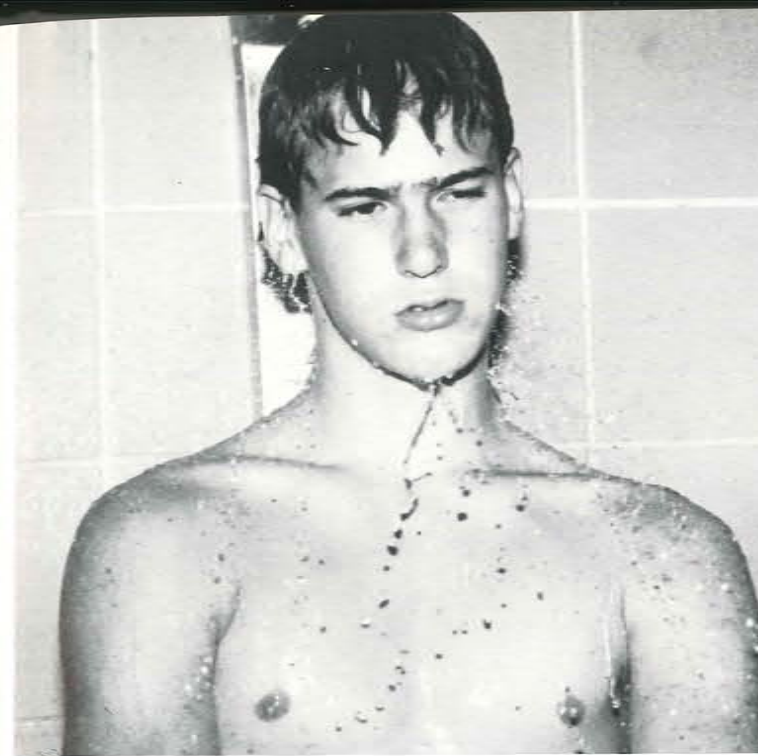
DORM LIFE

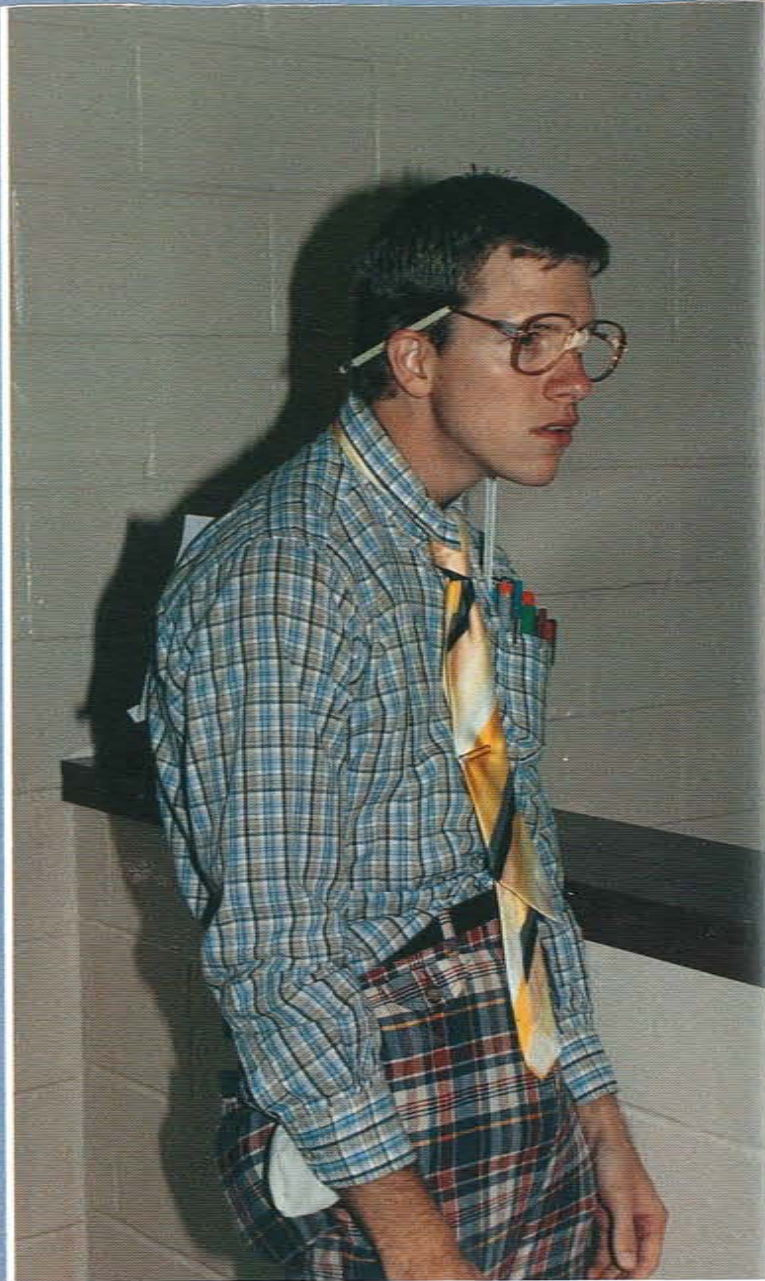

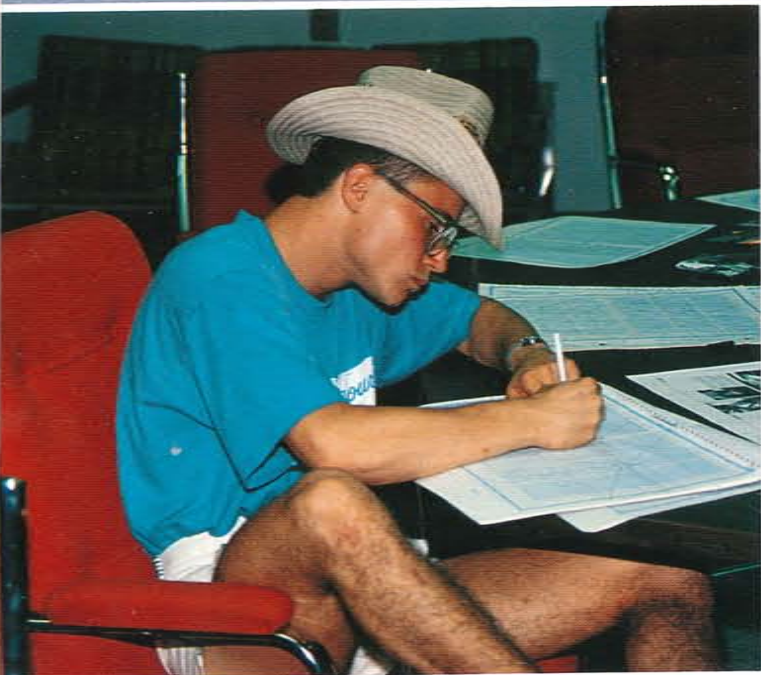

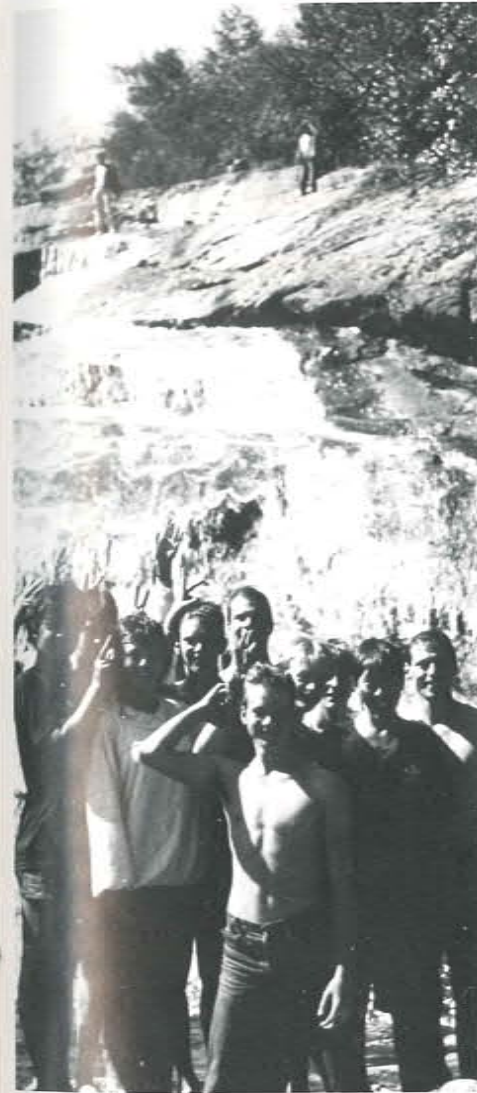
Weekends were made for ...

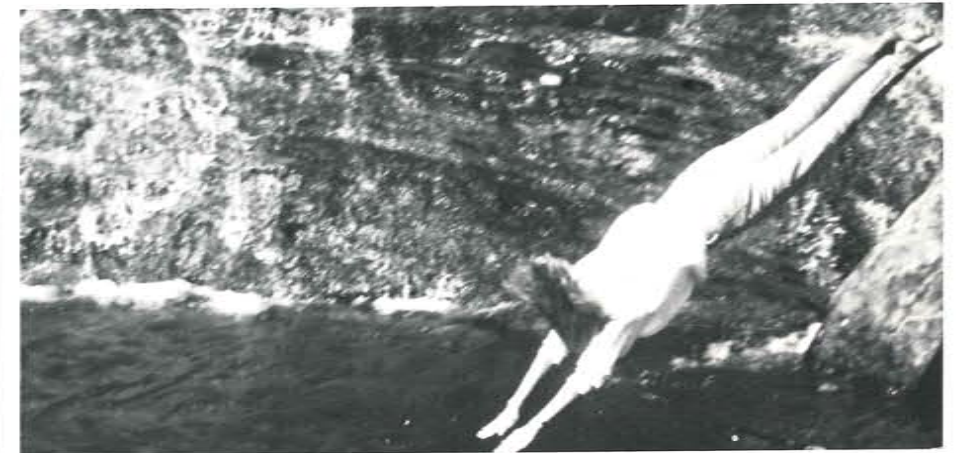

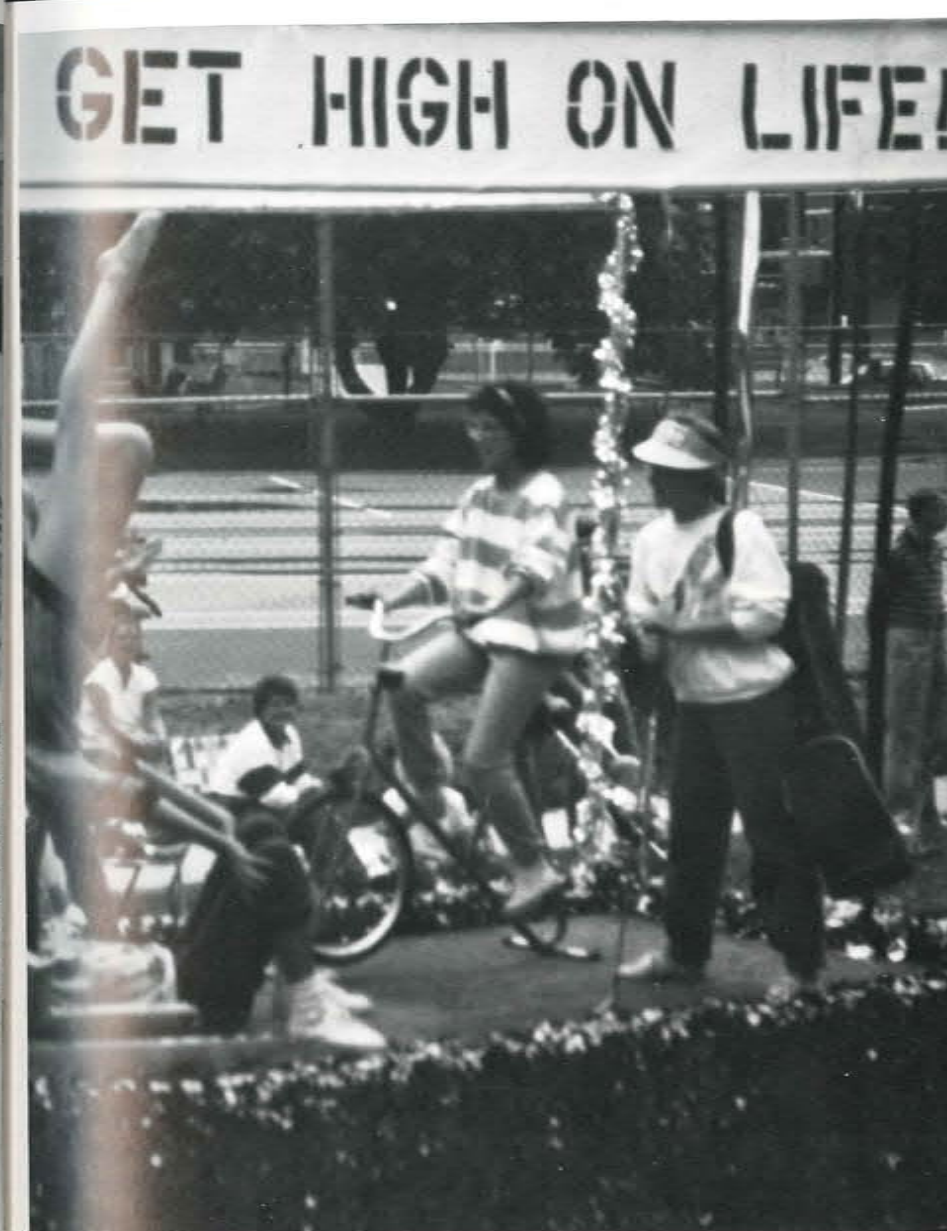

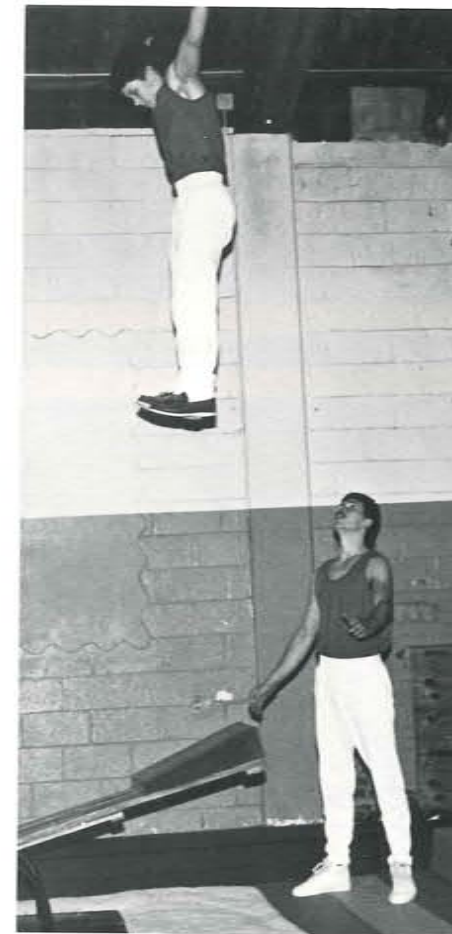
READY . . . HUP!

but on the tower, or Ron Martinez flopping on his flip. Over on the ladies' side of the mats you see flops and mess-ups done professionally.

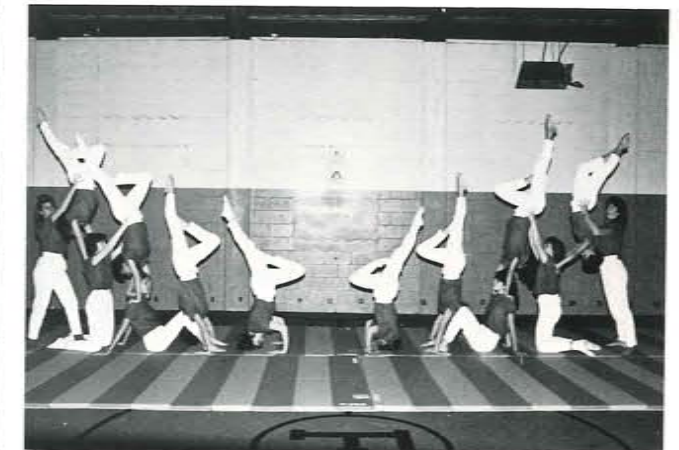
What counts is what the audience sees at show time. The team works together as one big family. It is this feeling of togetherness which make being on the gym team an experience worth all the pain and hard work.

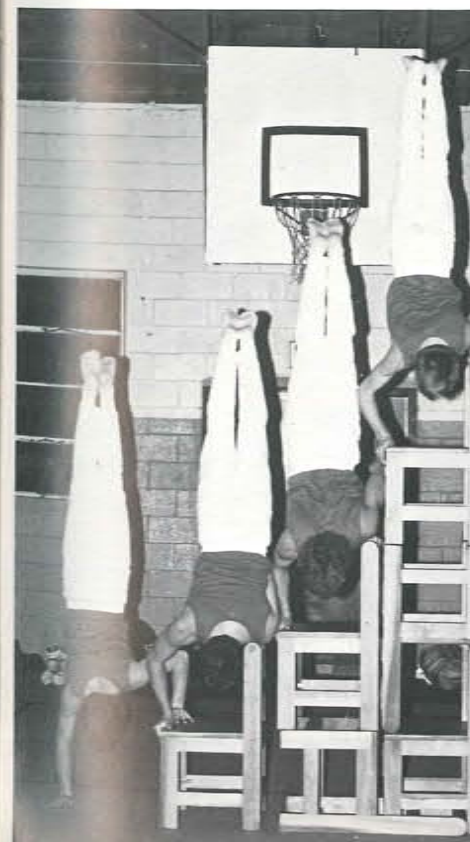

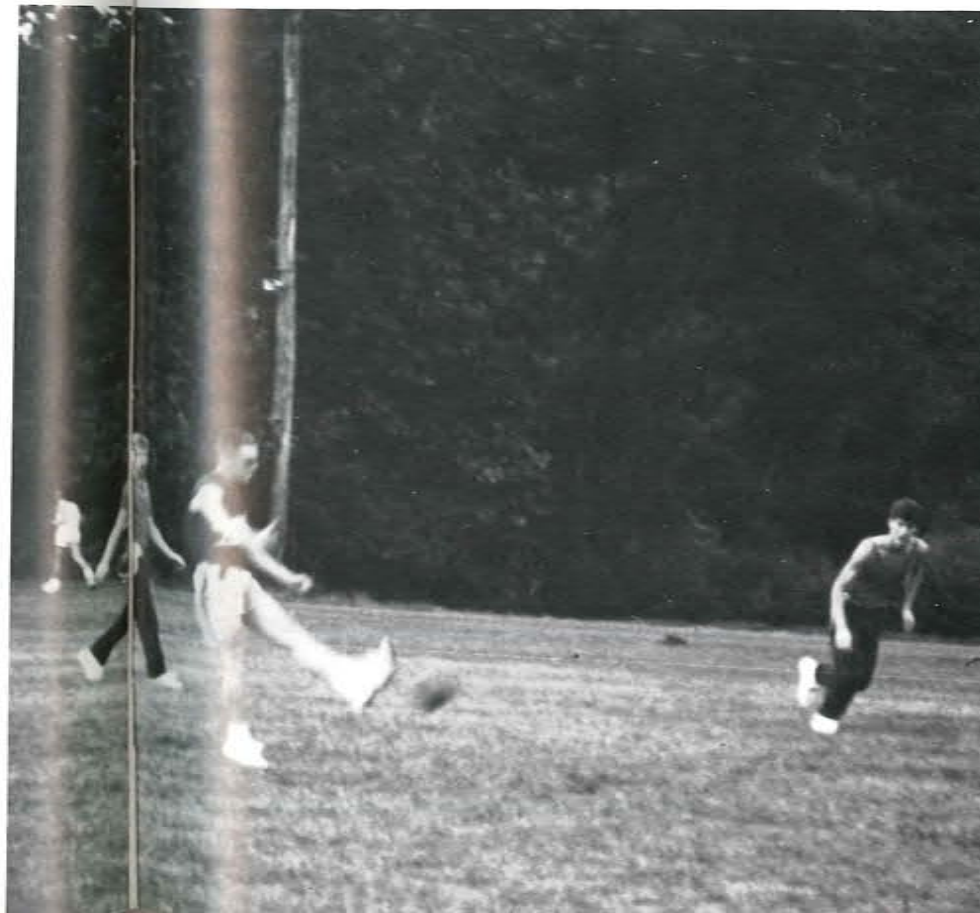

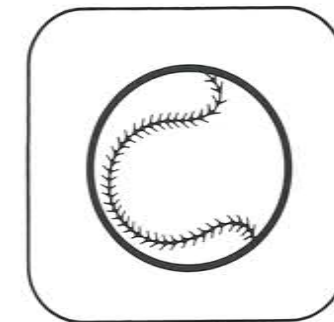

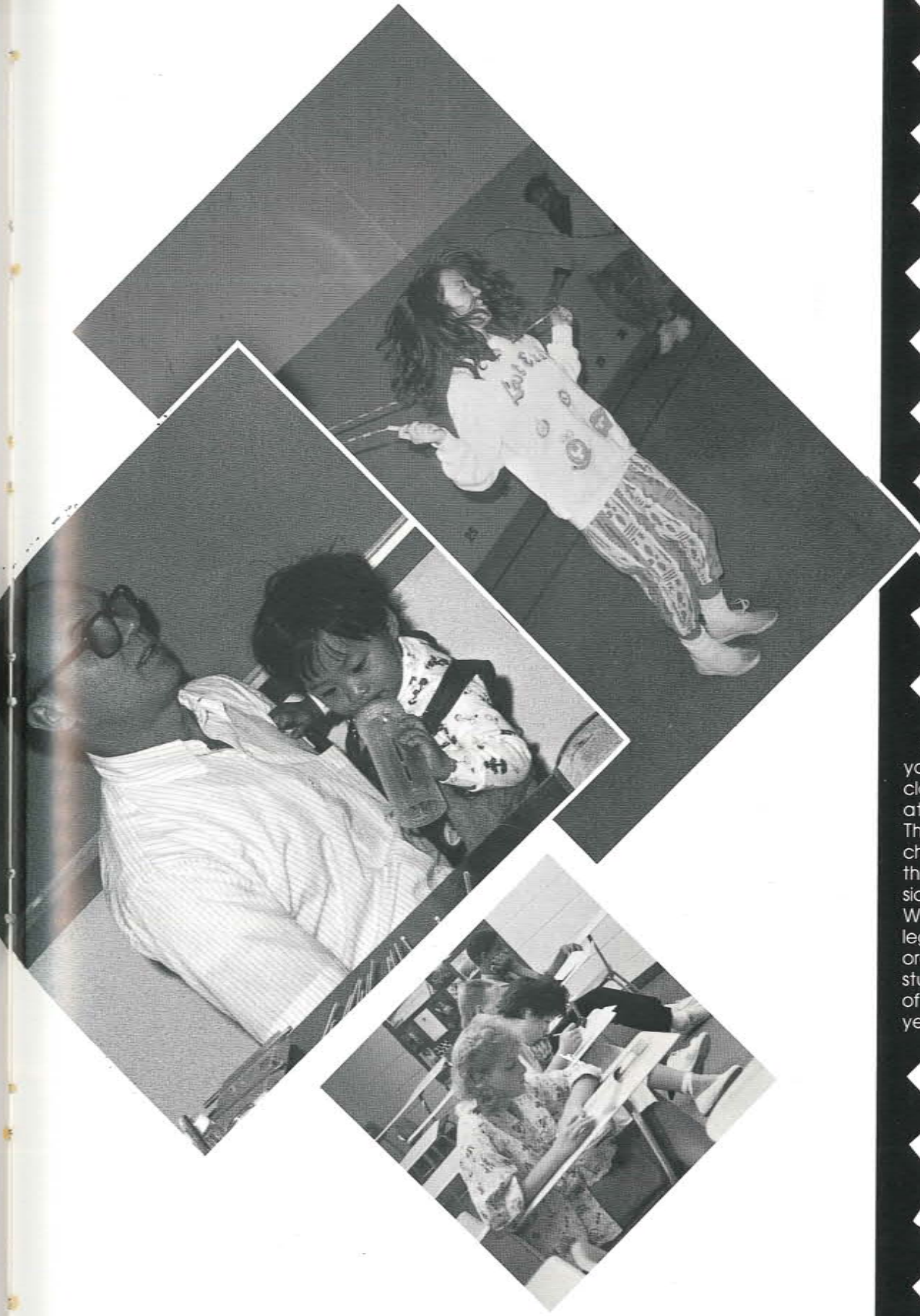

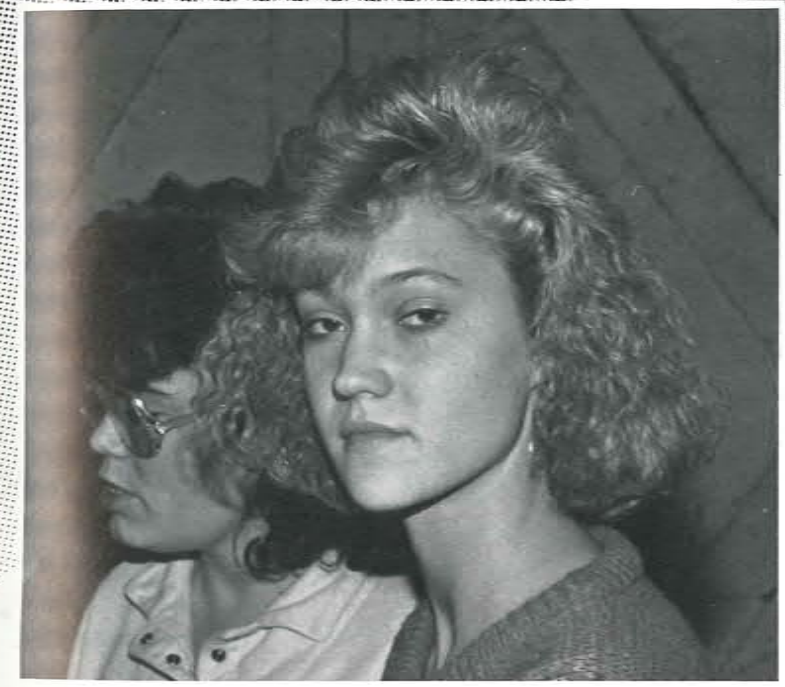
