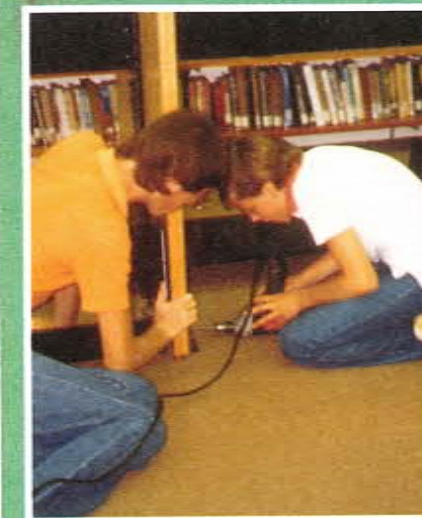

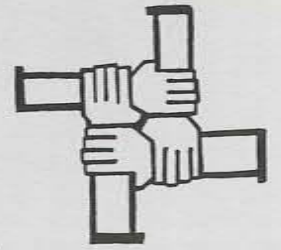

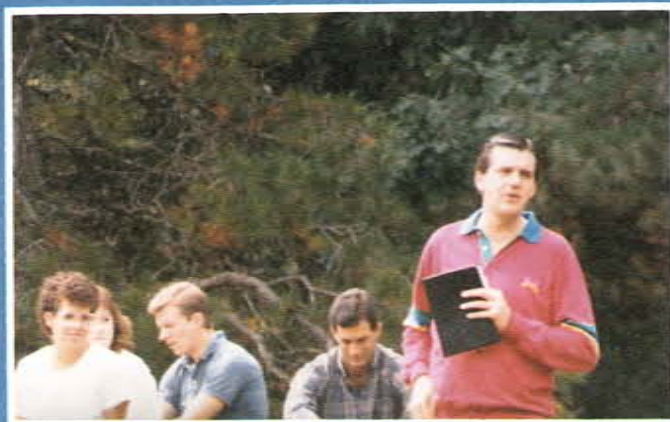

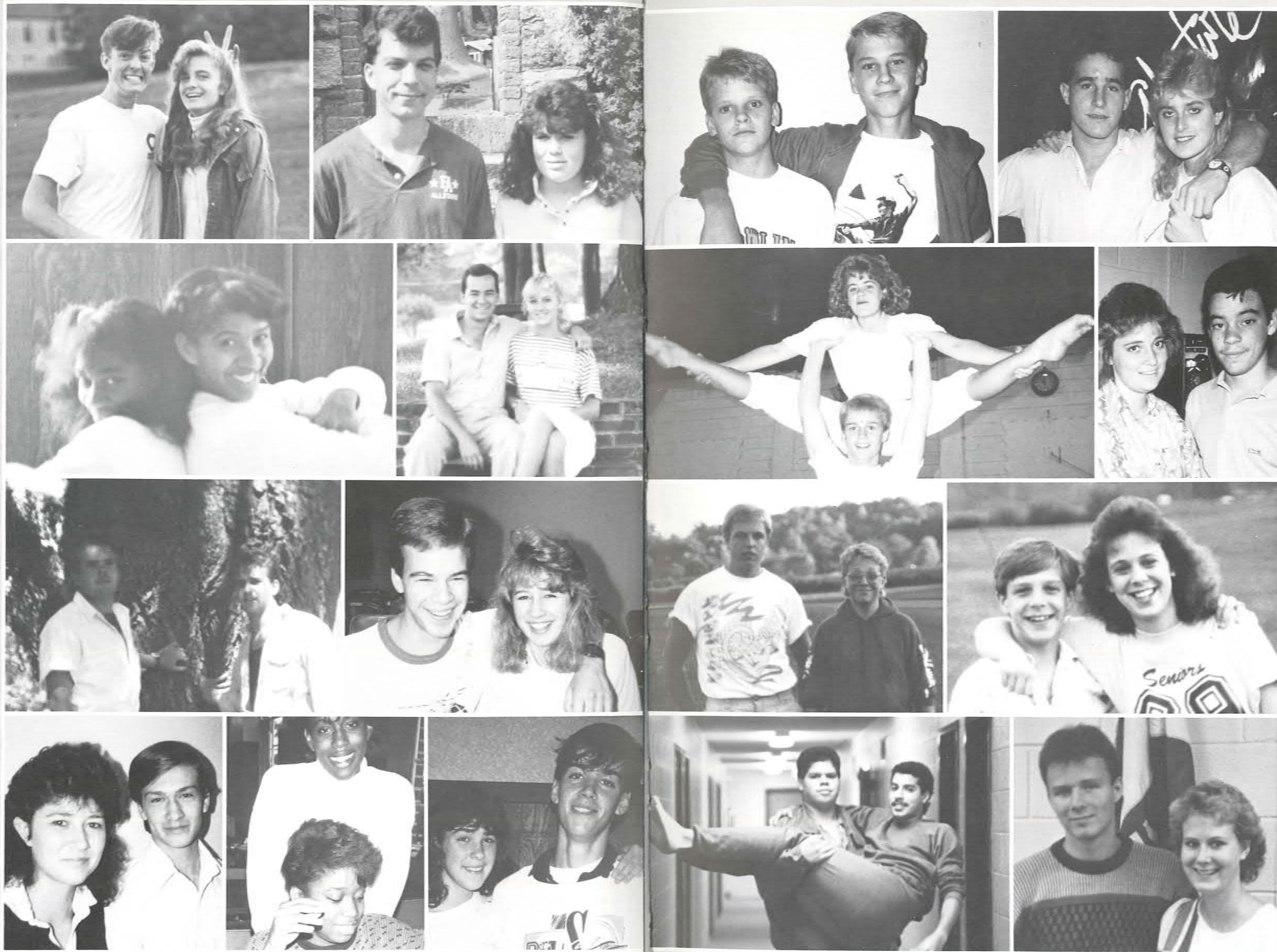

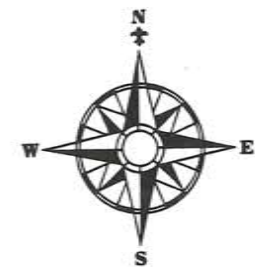

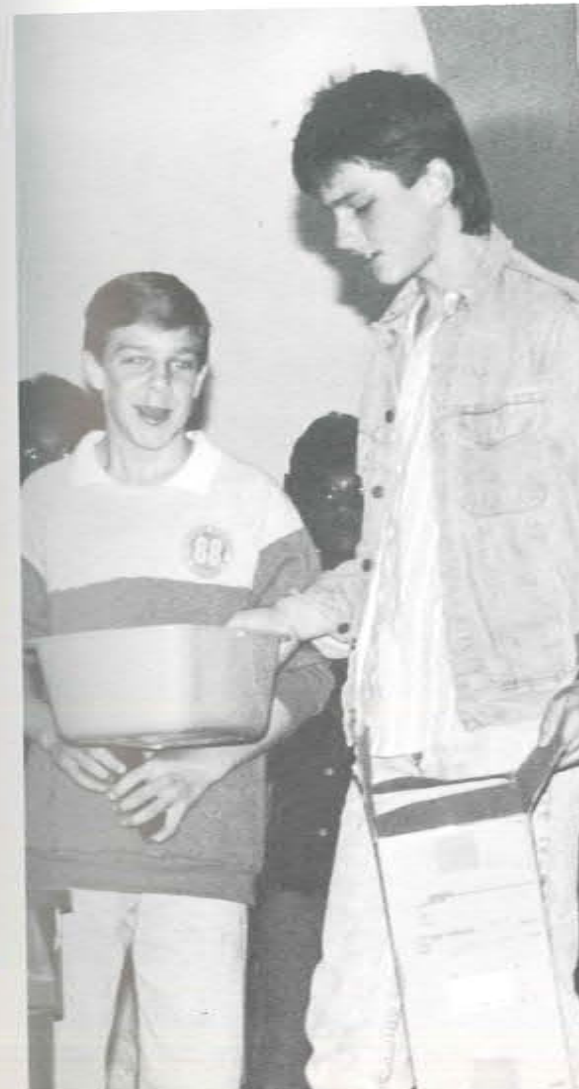

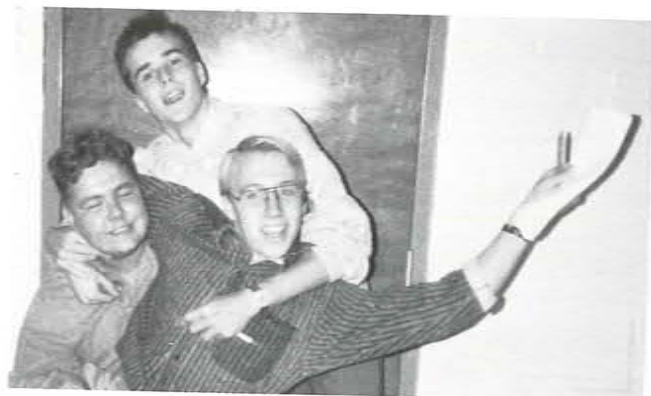

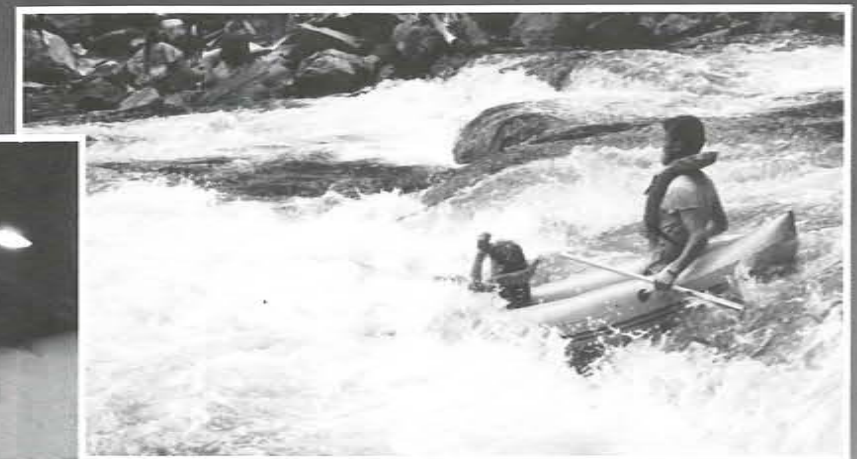

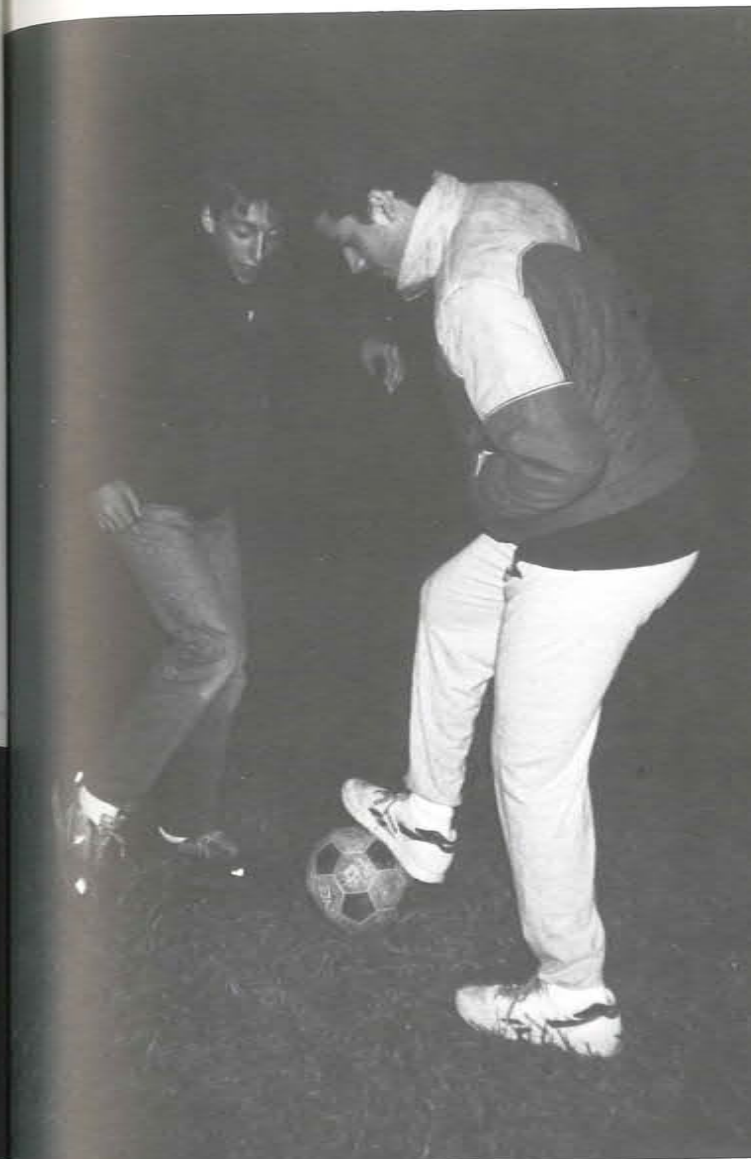

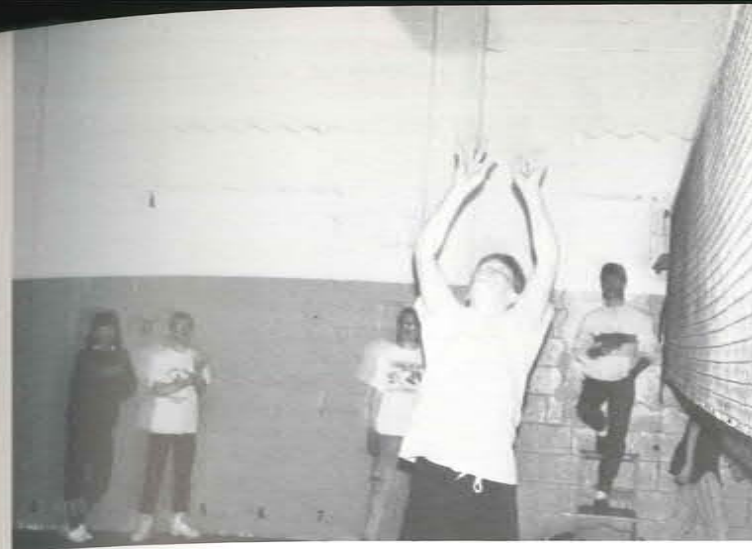

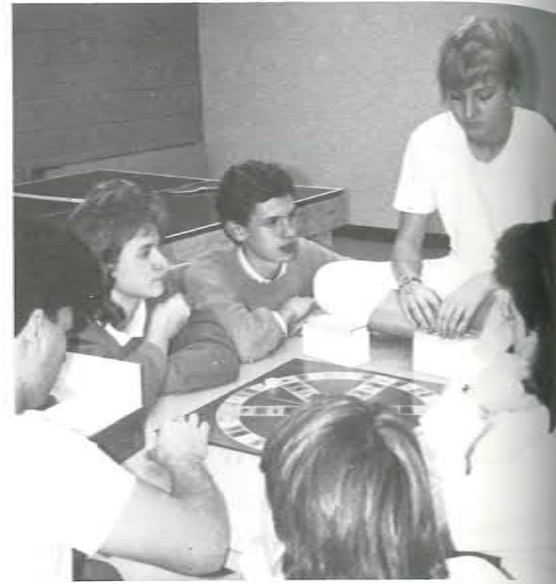

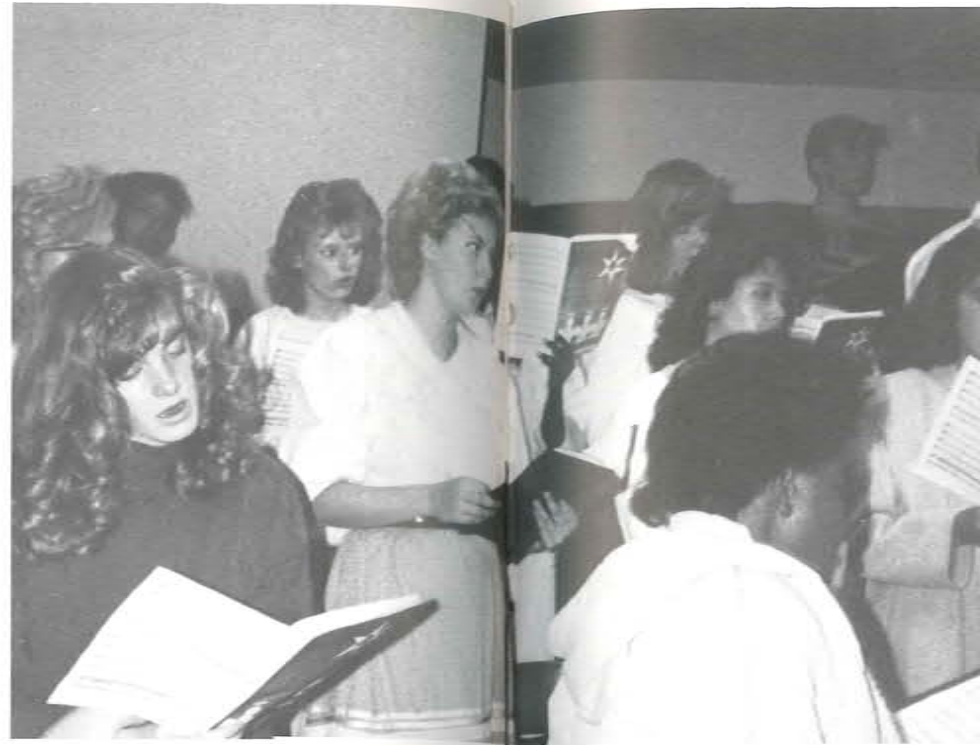

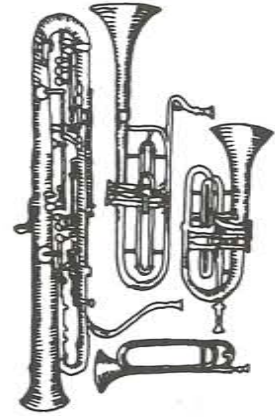

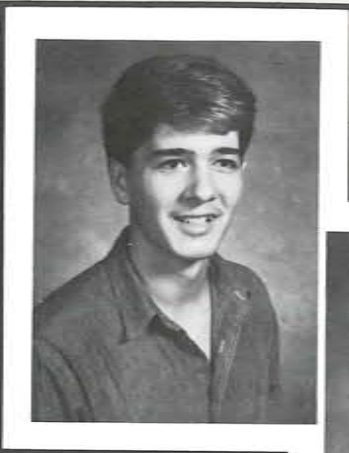
## CLASS OF '92
