



Greetings, hugs, and smiles begin to explode all around you and keep on exploding. Though your face soon seems glued into a plastic smile and you are baking in the sun




INVASION OF THE SMOKIES
















FALL PICNIC








SPORTING ACTIVITIES






With the football cradled in his arms, Billy Yates maneuvers his body to avoid the ever ready defense.














BASKETBAL


CLASS OF '92
